



When Westmar closed in 1997, the collection of art and autographs held by Westmar was turned over to the City of Le Mars. A few years ago, the City decided that the Plymouth County Historical Museum would be the best place for this large collection. Since then the Museum has gotten grants to frame part of the autographs and provide proper storage for the art and autograph collection.

Some of the artwork is hanging in the first floor hallway at the Museum through the Summer and into Fall.

Gary Bowling

Gary Bowling from Lamar, Missouri earned a Master of Fine Arts degree in 1974 from the University of Arkansas and shortly afterward, took an art teaching position at Westmar. He taught for about nine years taking a sabbatical from Westmar in 1981 to spend time at Yaddo, an artist's colony in Saratoga Spring, New York. He quit teaching in 1983 and moved back to Lamar to concentrate on his painting full time.

Mr. Bowling's next public showing will be at the Groveland Gallery in Minneapolis, Minn. from June 5 through July 18, 2009. His artwork can be seen on his website http://www.gbowlingstudio.com/.

John Gordon

John Gordon attended art schools and colleges in France and the United States and earned his Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of Iowa in 1952. He taught at several colleges around the country including Drake in Des Moines (1964-1967), Westmar (1972-1974), and finally Morningside in Sioux City (1974-1975).

Mr. Gordon has held one-man shows in Des Moines, Sioux City, Omaha and New York and group showings in Philadelphia, New York, Minneapolis, Summit, New Jersey, and Corpus Christi, Texas.

Mr. Gordon died on April 13, 2004.

Byron Jeys (1963) sent the alumni office a letter from his farm in Africa overlooking Lake Malawi. He regrets that he won't be able to attend the reunion this summer, but has invited any Westmar people visiting Malawi to stop and see him.

Byron tells us that he has lived in Malawi since 1985 when he went there to set up a national vocational rehabilitation program for disabled people.

After finishing the project, he was an education officer at a self-help secondary school which was modeled after Tuskegee Institute.

In 2001 he retired to his farm in an area where he and settlers had to build schools, churches, roads, bridges, a water supply, stores, grain mills, and every thing needed for survival.






Trost Plaque on Display
