I won't go into detail but we are pretty proud of our accomplishment and there are additions to it that will be put in place soon. We have had a lot of interest and of course it started with Westmar's display which keeps growing.

Wayne went to the Westmar Archive Room and found some interesting articles in the Gleams from 100 years ago. With the anniversary of World War I we reflect through some articles here.

"THE BABY WILL NOTICE THE DIFFERENCE" On Thursday afternoon, November 1, Miss Knowles, of Ames, Iowa, leader of home demonstration in this state, spoke in the chapel on "Food Conservation as a Patriotic Service." The three factors in winning the war, she said, are men, money and food. There must be an immediate readjustment of America's mode of living. Our nation has the name of being very wasteful but now we cannot waste and be patriotic. The people — especially the women—have been organized to distribute information concerning the shortage of food and methods of economy. There must be a saving of meat, wheat, fats, and sugar. We must send these supplies to our allies and use substitutes for ourselves because some articles, such as corn are not good for shipping and are not suited for their needs. Preach the gospel of the 'Clean Plate,' for "Bread and bullets must win the war." The war is a struggle for the right but it cannot be won unless the American people appreciate the situa-

There is no desire on the part of the government to curtail the amount of food that anyone shall eat. But it is necessary that we should change our ordinary diet so as to conserve certain foodstuffs. The most important of these are wheat, meat and sugar.

tion and act as patriotic citizens.

There are only three great wheat producing areas for the allies. Of these Russia alone has had a considerable surplus this year. But her situation with reference to her enemies is such that the transportation of this crop to the allies is impossible. For this reason it will either remain in her granaries or fall into the hands of the enemy. Argentine has had practically a failure in her wheat crop and has put an embargo on what there is. So no relief can come from that quarter. Canada and the United States are estimated to be 200,000,000 bushels short of a normal crop. The allies are looking to us for 550,000,000 bushels. If we use our ordinary amount

there will be 250,000,000 bushels to spare them. Where will they get the other 300,000,000 bushels? This means that we must change our diet or the soldier boys who are fighting our battles must go without wheat. It is our patriotic duty to eat at least one wheat less meal a day.

We must spare meat in order that our soldier boys may have a balanced ration. We must get along with two meatless days a week. Corn is a better foodstuff than wheat and on account of the large amount of oil which it contains it makes it possible for substitution for wheat.

Our responsibility in this crisis is tremendous. We have within our power to determine whether or not the lives of thousands of the men who represent us on the battlefield shall be preserved. At the present time 250,000 Soldiers are in France. Temptations and vice are rife about the camps and to save the men from the ensnaring influence is our duty.

The situation needs immediate attention. We ask you to show your patriotism not by a 'sensational display,' but by giving, by personal sacrifice. Jesus said, "Love thy neighbor as thyself." And Marshall M. Bartholomew says, "He dare not speak of loving who can bear that his brothers suffer and die, if by any sacrifice, no matter how great, he may be the means of saving them."

Let us show our interest by helping our soldiers and the suffering ones of Europe: let them know that we are back of them and that they are not fighting alone. And thus we shall conserve a force essential for the reconstruction period following the war.

A new member has been added to the efficient dormitory force. Her name is Pauline Agnes Pedro, dormitory cat, and she has the looking after of all the rats and mice that have taken up their abode in Union hall.

No one can doubt that the football team had the support of the student body in their game with Wayne. The "pep meeting" which was held Thursday evening was full proof of that. So much pep had never before been shown before any of our athletic contests. We were inspired also by the determination of the members of the team and especially by the resolution of each that, whatever the result of the game, he would play it clean. We are proud that that resolution was so faithfully carried out and that not only an athletic but also a moral victory was won. Yes, they won!!!

88 year old grandmother college student for a day

She's the grandmother often seen with a purple streak in her hair. She's the grandmother who isn't afraid to wear tattoos — the temporary ones, of course. On Friday, **Janet Nafe Lindsay '53** was the grandmother shadowing her granddaughter for a day at the University of Kentucky.

Lindsay, 88, who lives Pontiac, IL, was in Lexington for the week, visiting with her family, including her son **Grant Lindsey '84**. While in town, she spent a full day at classes with her granddaughter, Naomi Lindsay. Janet Lindsay has shown plenty of interest in UK since visiting Naomi for the first time over the summer. Last week, a plan was devised.

From 9 a.m. to nearly 1 p.m. Friday, Janet shadowed her freshman granddaughter at her four classes. Naomi said it meant a lot to her to have her grandmother there with her.

"My initial thought was that this is going to be awesome," said Naomi, a Tates Creek High School graduate. "I love my grandma and I'd love for her to see where I am every day. Right after that I thought, 'Oh no, she is 88. How is she going to be able to get to all of my classes? What will my professors think? Will they be OK with it?' But I have been in contact with a bunch of different people and they have all been tickled by the idea."

Janet is perfectly able to get from class to class — "I can do all the exercises the students can," she said — but her family thought it would be a good idea to provide her with a better way to get from class to class quickly. They secured a free scooter for the day from Grogan's Healthcare Supply.

She was thrilled by the experience, of course, but she couldn't help but be overwhelmed by the size of UK's campus and some of its classes. One of their classes Friday, psychology 100, had more than 500 students. "We didn't even have that many in the college I went to (Westmar University in Le Mars, Iowa)." Ever since Naomi was a baby, her grandmother helped out financially with the intention of sending her to college. It turned

out Naomi didn't need the full extent of her help: She received a scholarship to UK after completing the Governor's Scholars Program.

But Naomi wanted to show her gratitude; thus the offer to be with her for a day at college. "She is such a strong, independent woman. She's the most determined woman I have ever met," Naomi said. "She wears what she wants, she's friendly and talks to everyone. I've never heard anything negative come out of her mouth. I recently wrote a card to her because she loves to get mail. I told her how I want to be just like her when I grow up, because she is so true to herself and doesn't let anyone or anything get in the way."



We read Edgar Sheffield Brightman, "Introduction to Philosophy", so we learned the concepts by which philosophers work: ontology, epistemology, axiology, and ethics. Most classes just start to "philosophize".

Dean Thompson would pound his fist into the palm of his hand, stand in front of you, and ask "What do you think? And then wait while you thought. He asked for 15 minutes wait if he were not coming to a class—or his secretary would arrive to tell us that the Dean was busy. He asked us always to read the next chapter. Once, when none of us did that, he lectured on the next chapter for the whole period—and the final test asked a question about that chapter's ideas.

Guidelines adopted by the board at the Oct. 2015 meeting:

- Publish reunion information provided by Committee on Facebook, WAFA Web Site and in WAFA Newsletter.
- Provide mailing labels or mailing list for sending invitations. (USPS only or USPS plus e-mail)
- Provide use of group e-mail for invitation and updates.
 Committee would provide copy of message to send.
- Provide information on a personal PayPal account to accept registrations. Alternative to accepting checks only.)
- Provide contact lists of LeMars area hotels, caterers/ restaurants, and meeting rooms.
- Make room reservation at LeMars Convention Center, if needed, to get 40% non-profit discount. Pay for room, to be reimbursed by Reunion Committee.
 (Reunion Committee would have to set up and take down the room. Reunion Committee would make alternative room arrangements (i.e. church, restaurant).
- Make Westmar Memorabilia available for purchase in the Westmar Room and the Museum sales area.
- Publish reunion pictures in WAFA newsletter if pictures are provided with names and reunion identification.

Robert "Bob" Shaw '69, and his wife Kate celebrated their 50th anniversary with an unusual trip. In June, shortly after celebrating their 50th wedding anniversary, Kate turned to her husband and mentioned one quirky thing still on her bucket list.

"I told him something I've always wanted to do is drive across lowa and give away ice cream." she said. They already had a perfect vehicle. Thirty-two years ago, the couple, of Spirit Lake, IA, bought an old-fashioned open-air truck. Kate had spent every summer driving it around the lowa Great Lakes, offering treats to anyone who heard the sound of the truck's horn.

"We wanted to take our ice cream outside of that," Kate said. "It's a way to see all of lowa and meet all kinds of people. So, Bob and Kate, who are 72 and 71 respectively, set out in their truck on an epic tour of lowa, dubbed "Shaw's Ice Cream Adventure 2017."

Antique Archaeology in LeClaire was one of 13 planned stops on their two-week trip, which wrapped up in Algona. They had already stopped in places such as Storm Lake, Oskaloosa and Kalona, giving away around 4,000 treats along the way.

In their world, Bob who retired in 2010 to "become the ice cream man," said, "Ice cream is considered a vegetable. And a balanced diet is an ice cream treat in each hand." It made sense to incorporate this favorite into their "yearlong



celebration which has so far included a cruise in New Zealand and trips to Las Vegas, Los Angeles and Australia.

For their "Tour de Iowa," Wells Enterprises, the manufacturer of Blue Bunny, supplied the ice cream. The Shaw's arranged to pick up their Blue Bunny ice cream at Fareway grocery stores across Iowa and hand out treats in Fareway parking lots, as well as at Central Bank and Pizza Ranch locations, and at three Diamond Vogel plants in Orange City.

When people asked how they manage to make it to 50 years, Kate says "Bob says ice cream," but she says "Our faith in God and love for one another. We just have fun together."

They don't agree on everything but when they disagree, "We just have an ice cream treat and get over it," Kate said. "That's why I say, there's no problem so big that God and a little ice cream can't fix.
