HAPPY BIRTHDAY!!

We have a second milestone birthday to celebrate! **Norman Barker** turned **100** on November 18, 2020. He admits he's been slowing down a little more in the past year, but still manages to keep busy. He remembers being one of seven boys in his one room country school, and



the only one who went to high school, which later enabled him to go to college.

After high school, he joined the Army Reserves and then went to school at Western Union (Westmar) College for a year. He chose a discharge after his year in the reserves, but was soon eligible for the draft. That found him serving with the Occupation Forces in Japan with the 8th Army Headquarter in Yokohama. He says they needed a secretary, and since he learned to type in high school, he served the second highest ranking chaplain in Japan.

With an honorable discharge, he used the GI Bill to attend Iowa State focusing on farm operations.

"After a few months, he met his future wife (Ruth), and that was pretty important," he said. She added that they met in a Lutheran student organization. They were married October 7, 1951 in Craig.

Barker farmed with his father for about six years before venturing out on his own. In 1966, he was named an lowa Master Farmer, a program instituted by "Wallaces Farmer" magazine in 1926. He admitted he would not have gone into farming had he had to pick corn by hand. His father and grandfather kept up with the changing technology, and his dad had one of the first tractors with tires on it.

Barker was also actively involved with schools, and served a total of 13 years on three different school boards. After the districts were established, Barker was elected to the first Le Mars Community School District's Board of Directors in May 1959 and served as its first chairman. One of their first projects was to see a bond issue go through to build a new high school. Barker served on the board until 1968.

In 1987, he moved to Le Mars and found new ways to occupy his time by volunteering at the Plymouth County Historical Museum working closely with Wayne Marty for many years. His last work at the museum was done in 2019.

Barker was also a 4-H leader, member of the church, Le Mars Rotary Club, and was active in all of the activities.

Why does he believe he lived so long? "By staying active. I think after we moved to town, I still went to the farm every day. But also by having a wife that feeds and takes care of you very well," he said with a smile at Ruth.

The couple has four children, 11 grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren with another due in March.

Since **Steve Garrington** '71 retired from the US Army, he has been able to work with The Salvation Army in their Disaster Relief efforts. He spent two weeks at Ground Zero after 9/11. He has been to dozens of towns and cities ravaged by floods and tornadoes. While working one of his three, two week trips to New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina, he met Pam. It is her story that follows:

Thumbprint Miracle

Pam's voice cracked, and she bit her lower lip. Tears were almost ready to flow. "It hadn't been touched. It wasn't hurt by the water at all. It really was a miracle!"

She was holding a 3x5 frame that contained a small card. On the card I could see two tiny thumbprints that looked like had been made by a four or five year old. A local artist had, with a few strokes of a pen, transformed the thumbprints into two ducks sitting on a small pond.

"My baby was a special girl, and when we lost her..." the voice hesitated for a moment, "when we lost our little Lyn, I kept a lot of her things but this was special. It really is part of my angel. I took it to work and put it with her picture on the top shelf."

Pam had worked for the Salvation Army in New Orleans. She had been an accountant for them in a building not far from the Mississippi River. The building had been the headquarters of The Salvation Army for New Orleans and Southern Louisiana.

When their boss had heard that Katrina was on the way, he had locked the doors and sent the staff to the evacuation routes headed inland and for higher ground. No one was there when Katrina slashed ashore and threw her wind and rain against the Gulf Coast. No one saw what hit and smashed her office window. Perhaps it was only the force of the wind, or perhaps it was one of the hundreds of projectiles the wind used to bombard the buildings of New Orleans.

It really didn't matter, because when the levees had failed, the water had rushed in through her window and a hundred other places and flooded the bottom floor of Pam's building. In may offices, including Pam's, the muddy water had spun around moving and overturning desks and other pieces of furniture. Papers and files had been destroyed, and small items were gone forever.

A week or so went by and the water subsided and was returned, by the hand of man or the grace of God, to the Mississippi River. But the water was replaced by a more evil form of destruction—looters. Smashing and breaking and stealing, they had come. From room to room they had hunted for anything of value. They had pulled out and emptied drawers, and then they had smashed the thin wood beneath their feet. Then then they too were gone.

One last group of invaders entered Pam's office and many, many other buildings in New Orleans. These invaders were carried by the soft, warm breezes that blew through the shattered windows. Mold and mildew spores found a thousand places to breed and multiply and destroy.

This is how Pam found the room upon her return. With a mask upon her face, she opened the door and scanned the small office. Even through the mask, she thought she could smell the musty odor of decay. There seemed to be nothing left. Her eyes closed in prayer, but there were no words. It was a cry to the Lord. It was a call from the depths of her soul turning this whole mess over to God. Her eyes opened but there was no reason to enter this cave of destruction. And then she saw it.

The bookcase was leaning against the wall, just slightly. Its shelves were empty except for a layer of mud and filth. But on top, against all probability, sat a small plastic 3x5 frame holding a card with two tiny thumbprints. The water had not reached it; only a small dot of mold marred its surface; and this priceless jewel had been considered worthless by the looters.

As you would cradle precious crystals, Pam returned the plastic frame to its place on a new bookshelf in her new office. "It really was a miracle," she whispered. And in that city, that has suffered so much, the miracles God provides, even the small ones, were welcomed by everyone.
